Aline experienced constant abuse at the hands of her violent husband. He eventually married another woman and forced her to flee. Hungry, scorned and alone, Aline gained new hope when she took part in a Christian Aid community workshop in her village.

With a small start-up loan, she started trading avocados and peanuts locally. With her profits, she



bought a bicycle so she could transport goods to markets further afield. Eventually, her hard work had finally paid off, and she had earned the money she needed to rent a house.

Once Aline secured a home for herself, her three eldest sons were able to escape their father and join her. Today, Aline lives peacefully on her own plot of land. She's baked her own bricks and is building a strong home for her and her children. Now she can afford food, clothes and essential healthcare for her family. She's also purchased solar panels so her children can do their evening homework by electric light.

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#### Revd Shona Hoad writes ...

I recently went round the exhibition of Ernest Shackleton and the crew of the Endurance as they adventured to Antarctica (1914-16). It was a trip that was destined not to succeed in its quest. Looking at the extreme conditions they had to cope with, the unknown and icy landscape that needed to be crossed in order to summon assistance, and the indeterminate timeframe of the wait for rescue that some of the team had to endure, I was in awe of what others are willing to put themselves through in the pursuit of new discoveries and furtherance of knowledge. Some people are born to be adventurers and others are better suited to reading the stories of those who have ventured into unknown territory.

At St Andrew's we are embarking on a new venture – not in the same league as exploring the Antarctic but nonetheless trying something new. Starting in mid-May we plan to begin a Tots group that will meet on a Monday morning from 10 to 11.30am, using the space of the church to be little adventurers! This will be a time for parents/carers to gather with their under 4's for play, story time, music moments and a snack. Look out on our website or Facebook page for more details coming soon.

Whenever something new begins we can be hesitant to join in, or we might fear that we will fail and then feel foolish in the eyes of others. There are plenty of stories of failure and, arguably, the failure of Shackleton and the sinking of the Endurance is one of the most memorable. And yet, from the failure also comes the knowledge that people can succeed in other surprising ways with quiet determination and perseverance.

When Jesus died and the disciples who had ventured with him in and around Jerusalem fled in fear, it might have seemed that Jesus had failed to prepare them for what was to come. But the preparation continued after his death through his resurrection appearances and subsequent ascension to heaven. The

knowledge of his resurrection gave the disciples confidence to continue the work that had begun in sharing the understanding of God's love for the world. It empowered them to do miraculous things that were more than they could expect to do on their own account. It was their fearlessness in speaking of their faith that has enabled us to continue stepping out in faith. If you have questions about faith why not come and join us on our journey and discover it for yourself.

## News from St Andrew's

<u>Sunday 17th March</u>. Today's Morning Worship was led by Martin Hoad. In his sermon, inspired by the day's readings, Martin asked the question: "are we willing to put justice first and help other people, if it causes us suffering?" He said that God doesn't want us to be miserable but he does want us to listen and be prepared to serve. We should follow the example set by Jesus, who suffered so that we might have the opportunity of eternal life.

<u>Sunday 24th March</u>. Today we welcomed Rev Hugh Symes-Thompson to lead our service for Palm Sunday. Rev Hugh encouraged us to hold our palm crosses high with confidence. He said that the events of that Passover Day did not occur by chance. Jesus had planned that a donkey would be available, to fulfil the prophesy of Zechariah, of a king coming in peace. The chorus shouted by the crowd was from Psalm 118: "Blessed be he who comes in the name of the Lord."

<u>Good Friday</u>. Our worship with Shona and Martin took the form of "The Hour at the Cross" and included periods of silent reflection, short introductory pieces sung by the choir, readings and music.

<u>Sunday 31st March</u>. Easter eggs were the first thing mentioned in Rev Shona's sermon today and there was a Easter egg hunt after the service. She said that when Mary Magdalene came to visit Jesus' tomb she was alarmed to find the stone moved and the tomb empty. Once Peter learnt that Jesus was risen, he felt compelled to spread the message of love and hope. We may all fear death but that fear is smashed by the power of the Resurrection.

At Tregaminion there was an Easter reflection with music and pictures, with Nigel and Tracey Canning.

<u>Sunday 7th April</u>. Warren Nicholls had been due to preach the sermon today but was unfortunately unwell, so his words were read by Martin Hoad. He said that when the disciples met together, one week after Jesus' resurrection, they kept the doors locked. They were afraid that the High Priest's men would be looking for them. They might also have felt ashamed after denying that they knew Jesus; but he did not suggest that they had let him down. Jesus brought the gift of the Holy Spirit and gave them their mission. Warren's message continued by saying that Jesus also reminds us of our mission as he gives us new life. Let us go in peace to serve our risen Lord!

<u>Sunday 14th April</u>. Rev Shona referred in her sermon to the Gospel reading, in which we had heard that Jesus came among the disciples again. He made it clear that this was not in their imagination, as he invited them to touch him. He asked for food and ate it. Jesus reminded the disciples that it had been written in scripture that the Messiah would rise again. Rev Shona said that, just as the

# Swimming Pool Project 1970-1973

At a PTA meeting on the 24th Sept 1970 attended by John Libby, following his appointment as the new Headmaster, the second item on the agenda related to the provision of a swimming pool facility at the school as soon as possible in the following year.

John Libby at previous schools had been involved in the provision or upgrading of similar projects. He gave his full support to the PTA proposal. He considered it essential that as many children as possible should learn to swim as early as possible, bearing in mind the close proximity of the sea, rivers and other water dangers on farms etc.

It was agreed at the PTA meeting that the project should proceed and that fund raising for the project would start as soon as possible, so that the construction could proceed, to allow the pool to be available in the summer of 1971. A drawing of the proposed pool was prepared; and approved by the PTA and other interested parties, including the Local and County Authorities,

On the 21st April 1971 the site of the pool was marked out and an enthusiastic group of parents commenced work. The pool materials were delivered to the site with the assistance of Tourells Engineering of St Blazey on 28th April 1971. Work continued and the pool, along with the perimeter low level block walls and paved areas was completed to allow it to be opened on 12th June 1971 by the County Council Senior PE. Organiser Mr J. 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#### The Swimming Pool Project (continued from page 8)

It was then agreed that following the successful completion of the first stage of the project every effort should be made to provide a fully enclosed pool. This involved the building up of the perimeter block walls and pins, erection of the roof frames, roof covering and all associated works. This undertaking would occupy the parent workforce, on and off, for a further 18 months.

The most difficult stage of this project was the salvaging of clay coated trusses from an old clay dry near Par Harbour. The trusses were made available free of charge by ECLP. Tourell Engineering provided a crane to remove the trusses, vehicles to transport the trusses to the school and later, after modification of the trusses, placing in position on the block pins, all without charge.

The original Perspex roofing material proved unsatisfactory and was replaced by Filon. The parent workforce and others worked on the project at weekends during the winter months and evenings and weekends during the summer. This workforce was led and supported at all times by the Headmaster John Libby. The project was completed in the summer of 1973.

Many individuals and local businesses supported the project throughout with help and donations. It is unfortunate that there are no records of the amount raised for the project. John Libby estimates that, in the 30 years since the pool was completed in 1973, some 2000 children have learnt to swim in that pool.

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## In Quires and Places where People Sing

Some memories of the churches, chapels, beautiful cathedrals, and tin sheds in the jungle, that I visited during my army adventures. by Warren Nicholls

#### London and Aden

Having returned in the middle of May, we found London quite warm and bright, the leaves were all out and the parks ready for visitors. Millbank is just off the Thames and very central to the Tate, Parliament, or Westminster, and a short walk to central London: this for a country boy was fun.

The officers, with others, studied our findings, to prove it was worth while going out again. Kit and I went to a Service Records Office in North London, both ways during the rush hour. It was next to a synagogue: that was a beautiful building.



Royal Army Medical College, Millbank. The College moved from the site in 1999 and the listed building is now home to the Chelsea College of Arts.

One afternoon we were instructed to report next morning, looking smart! We all went by chauffeur driven car to the headquarters of BOAC, where there was a discussion between doctors, on a problem similar to what we had been investigating. We were included just to go over the ground work.

We were invited to stay with the others to lunch, in their executive suite. Well, can you imagine! You had to fill in a menu order, which I had help with, then very quickly the food came. I did not lick the knife!

But it went better than expected. We were included in non medical conversation. I think having two lowly soldiers there probably resulted in an increase to the ordinary amount of chat.

A month spent in the city on army pay soon passed. We then went to Edinburgh, where we met the next regiment and received lectures on "Hot dry climate."

ADEN. You will of course have heard of it now, with the present troubles, but back then we had to get out a map. Ah yes ... at the bottom end of the Red Sea.

The flight took about 13 hours in all and the shock of the heat hit you when the door was opened. A rush of heat passed through the opening, followed by an unidentified but unpleasant smell. Home for three months—it was different!

Our barracks were on the far side of an enormous harbour, close to an oil refinery, so the smell changed to burnt oil. The job was much as before, with units operating very close to the Yemen border. They were trying to keep the peace between tribes. This meant flying in out-dated aircraft up into the mountains, where we were dropped off, with all the food and the other passengers. The travelling from one place to another was by desert roads, or tracks more like.

The landscape was boring: endless sandstone, some small hills with distant mountains, scrub and dry bushes. The colours of the mountains changed as the sunlight moved over them. There were goats everywhere, wandering camels, all belonging to someone, snakes. Oh yes, and flies everywhere.

Small settlements were scattered around, but we wondered what anyone did? A few crops were planted, which needed watering every day. The goats would eat all the rubbish that blew around. Most of the men rode on a donkey, while the wives knew their place.

The flights around were bumpy, owing to the turbulence, rising air thermals from the heated sand. The temperature was about 35-40 degrees by day, when all your clothes became saturated; but you needed a blanket by night. There were film shows each evening, sitting under the stars—but as I travelled on my way from camp to camp, so did the film!

The three sites I visited were very different. One had a very rough air strip with a few local shacks beside it. I remember one blind man, who had been taught to sing, came along the camp fence, singing, in tune, "Jesus wants me for a sunbeam" and, if he was given anything, he could see what it was.

The best sight was at a place called Dallia. Perched on a hill were three towers where the local Emir lived, one tower for him, another for wives and children, the third was for his soldiers and his prison. It had a wonderful panoramic view; you could see for miles. There were the distant mountains; and, looking south, the Indian Ocean. Looking around one morning when it was cool, I thought, "what a place for a holiday camp."

Back in camp, the church was civilian administered and used by three denominations, without any fuss. There was a resident Chaplain, although the unit's Chaplain was based there as well.

Within a few days of arrival, the departing regiment had their Corps day. There were camel races, sort of stock car races, and the usual military barbecue. Sausages and bread rolls, all if which had to be imported, mostly from Kenya.

One afternoon I was crossing a football pitch when I saw an officer, from yet another unit stationed there. I recognised him from Lostwithiel. I had seen his brother just before I left. He was from a family I just knew, but had no contact with, except that I saw them in church. They were there on an occasion when I read the lessons. I spoke, He was amazed that I knew who he was. Even when I told him that I had recently seen his brother, he was hardly interested. "Just like his mother!" I thought.

The six weeks flew past, and having bought a few things locally—a camera, a watch and chain for my dad, a hand made gold pin on a chain, and about a dozen bath towels—we flew home, stopping in Malta. The local paper carried the headline, "USA President assassinated."

Home in the cold, waiting for the next trip.

<u>Polmear Orchard</u>. Speaking as a member of the public, Judy Brereton reported on behalf of PL24 that they have got agreement from Cornwall Council to cut Polmear Orchard 4 times, the first being as soon as it's dry enough. Once this is done they will look to arrange a work party to re-stake and weed where needed. They get the Cormac trailer so any weeds can be taken away. PL24 are also looking at getting funding for extra seats. She mentioned that Resilient Orchards Cornwall who may be able to help if needed. A successful Wassail had been held there in January and it was hoped it will become an annual event.

Moorland Road. Cllr Virr said that Cormac had agreed additional 20mph signs.

<u>Hamleys Corner</u>. It was agreed that Stratton Creber should be instructed to sell the toilet block at their May auction and that Cllr A Wildish should progress this in the absence of the Parish Clerk.

<u>Flood Protection</u>. As a a follow-on from the Starr project, Cllr C Wildish had met with Cornwall Council and the consultants to write a climate adaptation plan for Par and St Blazey, to look at the potential impacts of future climate change.

<u>North Street</u>. Cllr Hughes reported that the Wicton planning application will go to committee due to concerns of residents.

<u>Polpey Lane</u>. Clir Truscott said he has reported the poor state of Polpey Lane and the recent land slip that could cut off the farm if it gets worse. He has also been approached by a householder at the bottom of Polpey Lane whose property flooded recently due to blocked drains.

<u>British Legion</u>. Cllr Phillips reported she would no longer represent council at British Legion meetings.

<u>Treesmill</u>. Cllr Phillips confirmed that she had reported the bad condition of the Treesmill to Wings road.

<u>Parish Rates</u>. Cllr Hazeldean queried the increase in council precept. It was done to help us to pay for managing assets that have been devolved to us.

<u>Desalination</u>. The information group have another event in St Blazey on Thursday next week and wanted to encourage councillors to attend. Cllr Hughes reminded the council that it is important not to express a view as this could exclude anyone that does from any subsequent decisions.

<u>St Andrews Road</u>. Cllr Nicholls said he had been approached by people who want a zebra crossing by the bus stop in St Andrews Road.

<u>Fly tipping</u>. Cllr Phillips reported that Lanescot has suffered badly with fly tipping. It has been reported and may be partly due to charges at waste sites. It is important to get registrations where possible so action can be taken.
